

HEALTH CAREER PATHWAY CHART FOR PRE-HEALTH STUDENTS IN CALIFORNIA

The information below is based on the most updated research done by Pre-Health Dreamers (PHD). Please note that this information is subject to change. We recommend that you use this document as a starting point to begin your journey in researching professional programs. This document was created to help support individuals who have Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), Temporary Protective Status (TPS), or who do not have a Social Security Number (SSN).

Financial Aid	Students who meet AB540, AB2000, OR SB68 requirements, submit a California Dream Act Application (CADAA) during the application timeline, AN meet GPA and income requirements, can qualify for Cal Grant tuition assistance at the CCC, CSU, or UC for undergraduate ADN and BSN programs. 	Please note that students do not qualify for Cal Grants at the graduate and professional level. However, campuses may use the CADDA or an in-house fina aid application to determine students' need for financial assistance. Students are encouraged to speak with a financial aid representative at their prospective school at least a year before applying to school. Students planning to attend a private institution are encouraged to speak with the financial aid office at their future campus to receive information on the school's process regarding state and institutional aid. We encourage students to initiate these conversations at least a year in advance.							
Clinical Requirements	Clinical clerkships begin traditionally during the third year of the medical program. Clerkships vary from 4- 8 weeks and include internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics and gynecology, pediatrics, family medicine, psychiatry, neurology, radiology, etc.	Clinical preceptorships may be integrated with classroom education. Students receive handson experience in a variety of healthcare settings and specialties. Preceptors and clinical sites are specific to each program.	Clinical rotations w/ no extensive traveling. Most schools have their own dental clinics for training. Rotations will occur during the last two years of dental programs.	Complete 1,500 internship hours. - ★ In 2014, Gov. Brown signed SB 1159 (Lara), which requires licensing boards within the Department of Consumer Affairs to accept an individual tax identification number in lieu of a social security number for professional licenses. This law went into effect January 1, 2016 and enables all California students who qualify to sit for specific licensing exams, including the California Bar Exam, and to become licensed upon passing the exams. The law also prohibits any entity within the department from denying licensure to an applicant based on his or her citizenship status or immigration status.
- ★ SB 1139 (Lara, 2016), specifies applicants may not be denied from pursuing a medical degree and other healing arts residency training programs simply because of their immigration status.
